Golden Valley Community Service Commission Fund Allocations

Since the GVHSC's inception (now the CSC), \$1,992,752 has been allocated to agencies. For 2023, the Golden Valley Community Service Commission allocated \$60,000 to 12 local human service organizations: Damascus Way (\$2,700), Greater Minneapolis Crisis Nursery (\$2,000), HUG (\$5,000), CEAP—Northwest Suburban Dinner at Your Door (\$6,500), PRISM (\$16,000), ResourceWest (\$1,800), Senior Community Services HOME Program (\$7,000), Senior Community Services Outreach (\$6,500), Sojourner Project (\$5,500), Sweet Potato Comfort Pie (\$1,500), The Bridge For Youth (\$4,000), YMCA-New Hope (\$1,400).

Greater Minneapolis Crisis Nursery

The Crisis Nursery provides free, voluntary services 24 hours a day, 365 days a year to families in crisis with young children. Current strength-based services include a 24-hour helpline/crisis de-escalation services, 3-day residential respite and medical care for children using the Nursery Way trauma-informed care model, and home-visiting services.

HUG HUG provides support to families prenatal and postpartum up to a child's second birthday, including home visits with a licensed Early Childhood Family Education (ECFE) specialist, information on community resources, and opportunities to connect with other parents with newborns from your own community. HUG partners with The Diaper Bank, MN, a non-profit organization to collect new diapers, pull-ups, and wipes for families struggling with this daily need.

CEAP—Northwest Suburban Dinner At Your Door
